

A Sneak Peak at Toby's Sabbatical...

From September 1 through October 31, thanks to the generosity of this congregation, I will be taking my first sabbatical since joining you just over 5 years ago. I will be in Ireland for the first month and in the Basque Country of Northern Spain for the October portion.

I will begin my time in Ireland in Belfast at a retreat center run by Garreth Higgins — a writer, theologian, film critic, and peacemaker — whose work I became familiar with during Covid. He will be co-leading this retreat with renown contemporary theologian Diana Butler Bass, whose books have been tremendously influential in the last 20 years.



Next, I'll spend just under two weeks seeing as much of Ireland as I can. I'll be renting a car in hopes of seeing as much of the coastline as possible, along with as many Irish jam sessions as I can in pubs and community centers throughout the country.

As September draws to a close, I will fly from Dublin to Bilbao Spain on Aer Lingus, where I will begin a 100-mile stretch of the famous "Camino," an 800 mile pilgrimage you can learn about if you watch the wonderful Martin Sheen film from 2010 called "The Way." I'm still not sure if I'll be walking or biking my beautiful 100-mile stretch from San Sebastian to Bilbao. It will all depend on my soon-to-be-replaced ankle. I'll be covering

around 13-15 miles per day, staying in little hostels along the way.



My Camino journey will end right where my two nephews live, on a working farm near Bilbao. I will rest and recover there under the incredible hospitality of my nephew's mother and father-in-law, who have become famous for their meals, beverages, and revolving kitchen door of guests all year long. While there, I may also take advantage of a language immersion experience in Bilbao. My Spanish has come a long way but still has some really big holes, especially involving verb forms and tenses.

I'll return to the states just in time to move out of my Bay View cottage and back into my Petoskey rental. I couldn't be more excited about this amazing opportunity that my favorite church has provided for me. I'll be sure to return to you with lots of photos, sound files, and travel tales. The September newsletter will delineate how my time away will be covered here at the church. You are going to be in excellent hands.



Reaching Out Theme

July/August Reaching Out Theme: Welcoming the Strangers Among Us -Honoring Immigrants, Migrants, and Guest Workers in Charlevoix



This summer, as we enjoy the beauty and abundance of Northern Michigan, the Reaching Out Committee invites our church family to pause and consider a vital part of our community that often goes unnoticed: the immigrants, migrants, and temporary workers who help make Charlevoix thrive.

Many of the fresh fruits and vegetables we enjoy—from sweet cherries and crisp apples to tender squash and bright berries—are harvested by guest workers who come here on H-2A

visas. These men and women often travel great distances, leaving behind families and communities in Mexico, Guatemala, and beyond, to work in our local fields and orchards. Their labor is essential to our local agricultural economy—and to our daily meals.

Others contribute in different ways. International students arrive on J-1 visas to work in restaurants, resorts, and service industries throughout our busy summer season. Businesses like The Earl, the Weathervane, The Castle, Landscape Logic, and Northern Michigan Property Management depend on these young people, who bring energy, hope, and a global perspective to our lakeside town. Still others have made Charlevoix their permanent home. They may run businesses, staff our salons, serve our meals, or even worship in the pew beside us. Some are long-established immigrants, while others may be newer arrivals—still finding their way in a new language and culture. Some are our neighbors. Some are already friends.

As a church grounded in love, justice, and radical hospitality, we believe that learning about the lives of these individuals is one way to live out our faith. On August 17th, we will welcome a guest speaker to Sunday coffee hour to help us explore the experiences, challenges, and contributions of immigrants, migrants, and guest workers in Charlevoix. Details will be announced soon.

We hope this conversation will help us see with clearer eyes and respond with more open hearts. We want to better understand the people behind the produce, the students behind the smiles, and the families behind the storefronts. And above all, we want to let them know they are seen, valued, and welcome—both in our community and in our church.

Please join us this summer in reaching out, learning more, and offering Christ-like hospitality to the many who have journeyed far to be part of our shared life here in Charlevoix.

CharleVOICES Event



On May 30th, the sanctuary of the 1st Congregational UCC Church, of Charlevoix, was filled not with hymns, but with stories—true, personal accounts of struggle, resilience, and hard-earned transformation. The event, hosted by CharleVOICES: True Stories Told Live, centered on the theme "Overcome" and featured six local storytellers who took to the stage to share defining moments from their lives. In showing up to help another, Hugh Hansen discovers an unexpected truth—that the support he offered was the very healing he needed. Colin Morris shared a quiet, powerful story of losing—and rediscovering—the deep human need for connection and belonging. Jen Way shared a journey that begins in loss and gently leads to strength, where sorrow softens and love learns a new way forward. Ellen Bennett takes us back to a summer camp where an unexpected journey of self-discovery began—a story of identity, truth, and the winding path to becoming herself. Using a family of phoenixes to tell her tale, Lisa Copass shares a powerful story of loss, renewal, and discovering her true purpose and passion. Larry Denemy story is rooted in generations of cultural resilience and lived experience reminding us that overcoming is not just personal but ancestral.

CharleVOICES was blessed by having the use of the beautiful sanctuary. The stage was backdrop of doors painted for a past event. A special thank you to Bill Trubilowicz and Ellen Hess for sound and video recording. CharleVOICES raised over \$600 for the Rayder Generous Heart Fund. Principal Dan Terryberry spoke about the Fund just before intermission.


The weather was great and the interest was high for this special event, with many volunteers gathered to show the community how much we care about helping those in need. There were 12 booths from various other organizations in total.
