



FROM THE PASTOR...

As we wrap up our 8-week series on Jesus's parables, I find myself overwhelmed with gratitude for what a gentle and wise teacher our Rabbi Jesus is. The parable - as a teaching method – lines up perfectly with Jesus's compassionate, creative, and patient demeanor. He never forced himself or his message on anyone. He didn't even engage in persuasion nor any other form of salesmanship. He believed in and totally trusted in the inherent power of the seeds God provided for him to sow. As the parables themselves emphasize, some of those seeds will take root and some won't. Some will spring forth from the ground readily, while others may take months or even years. But Jesus wasn't bothered by any this. When you trust that much, you've got all the time in the world to be patient, to wait upon the Lord, and to let nature take its course.

in the Father's seeds and His providence I think that we in the church, particularly when it comes to our kids and grandkids, are constantly freaking out because they don't seem to be 'getting it' where Jesus and Christian faith are concerned. They won't come to church with us and certainly aren't interested in finding a faith community of their own. They don't seem to want to engage with us in conversations about the Bible or the latest Toby's Take podcast. We become edgy. We push a little harder. We resort to new forms of persuasion or manipulation.

But what we don't do is trust. What we don't do is what Jesus did time and time again, which was to simply plant one seed and then leave the rest to God. We don't believe that God has got this where our kids are concerned. We don't exude that Christ-like patience, that unconditional love and support that isn't tied to whether they get on board with our religious program.

Dallas Willard called Jesus "one of the most absolutely relaxed people who ever lived on this earth." (The Scandal of the Kingdom, p. 67) That chill vibe Jesus had was a direct result of the profound confidence Jesus had in the seed of the Word that his Father had provided. Jesus didn't have to see results to know that the seed was doing what seeds do—underground, invisibly, and over time. (Cont'd on next page)

Do you remember that story of the Rich Young Ruler in Luke 18? That young prince asked, "What must I do to enter the kingdom of God?" After Jesus answered his question, that man walked away from Jesus. He didn't follow Jesus, didn't join the movement, and didn't seem to want to change how he was living. We have to notice that Jesus didn't try to convince him otherwise. Jesus didn't run after him, saying, "Hey, wait a minute...let's talk about this a little further." Jesus just let the man walk away. He knew he had planted a seed, and he knew that it was the Father's business – not his – to help that seed take root, germinate, and start growing. Jesus also knew that this process would happen in God's time, not in His. Luke didn't give us the end of the rich man's story. But I have a strong hunch that he came back around in God's time. And so, our Rabbi Jesus was relaxed, filled with peace. Oh, that we might learn to go and do likewise. Amen.

Pond Hill is a beautiful farm that brews beer and has its own vintner as well. It is a super family-friendly place, so bring your kids and grandkids. There are animals to pet, chickens to feed, and farm-to-table meal options, along with their famous wood-fired pizzas.

The band will also be performing at Bay View's 150-year celebration gala on *Sunday, July* 6 in the late afternoon/early evening right *on the campus of Bay View*. (The exact time is to be determined.) This will be a ticketed event, while the Pond Hill gig is free.



The church is a body, made up of many parts (1 Corinthians 12:12–27.) Each person brings something unique, and sitting in a new seat can be a simple but profound way to experience the beauty of the whole body of Christ. It reminds us that the Church is not about personal routine or preference—but about community, connection, and growing in love.

So, next Sunday, consider trying something new: sit somewhere different. Greet someone you've never greeted. Worship with a different view. You may be surprised how God meets you there—in a new seat, with new people, and with new perspective.

After all, sometimes a small change in where we sit can lead to a big change in how we see.




Sunday, August 10 - Come Sow Seeds of Hope!

Outdoor services will begin Fathers' Day - June 15 - and will continue every Sunday through Labor Day weekend - except when it's raining. It is crucial for the congregation to know the following:

We meet outdoors every Sunday because the Tech team that runs all the sound and streaming for the services has a much easier time staying in one location. It is very difficult to move all the required equipment back and forth from Sunday to Sunday. However, they will have to move it indoors on the Sundays when it rains, of course.

For those who are concerned that meeting outdoors may be uncomfortable for you, please remember the following:

- This summer we will have a much larger tent/sail covering the vast majority of the lawn, so no one will need to be exposed to the sun unless they want to be.
- We have a completely covered and raised porch that is fully handicapped accessible by means of our elevator and entrance through Ransom Hall.
- That raised porch always has our most comfortable, stuffed living room chairs on it, so no one has to navigate uneven ground nor sit in fold up chairs unless they want to.

All our summer services will be streamed as usual, so you need not miss anything if you are unable to make it in person.

Please be sure to give a huge thanks to our Sound Tech Team of Bill Trubilowicz, John & Ellen Hess, Meg Kitson, and Don Smith who go way beyond the call of duty to make it possible for us to meet outside so comfortably.
