#### FROM THE PASTOR...

The month of April will be one we'll all remember for a long, long time. The great ice storm of 2025 was the worst storm of any kind that Northern Michigan has seen since the 1970s. It brought life to a virtual standstill with no power, no available gasoline, and no access to food, whether at a restaurant or a grocery store. It was a really scary week for many of us.

In our communion celebration on Sunday, April 6<sup>th</sup>, many of us shared the experiences we had of being helped by human angels – neighbors who looked beyond themselves and their own needs in order to assist others. I was one such recipient of angelic ministers. My first angel was our office manager, Stacey Luoma. Not only was I, like everyone else, unable to get gas at a gas station for a 5-day stretch, but my car was completely empty. Given that my car had been my phone charging station, I was really out of luck. But then Stacey showed up with 5 gallons of gas for me. Because much of East Jordan was not hit by this storm and did not lose power, their gas stations were open, and Stacey purchased gas and delivered it all the way to Petoskey. I was deeply grateful and profoundly moved.

About the same time, the basement in my rental house completely flooded due to no power to the sump pump. The combination of that, no heat, no hot water, and trees continuing to snap and fall all around my rental house, led to my need to evacuate. That's when Teri and Bud Stout called from all the way down in Anguilla to offer me their home on Lake Charlevoix. They had a generator and everything I needed. What a gift!

Last but not least, when I went over to check on my Bay View cottage, I discovered that 5 trees had fallen on various parts of the structure. I was devastated. My first instinct was to try to get these trees and their weight off this 137-year-old rickety, foundation-less structure. Enter Jeff Mason with his chainsaw and MacIver-type skills. He spent hours with me on Friday after work getting the worst of the trees off my roof. This was neither easy nor light work, but Jeff was more than willing to do what needed to be done.

We will see first-hand the work Habitat does. Northwest Michigan Habitat for Humanity will be doing a development closer to Charlevoix, hopefully soon.



#### From the Reaching Out Team

The recent ice storm was a scary challenge for all of us, and while we all made it through, the storm did expose some weaknesses in our overall preparedness for such emergencies. With this in mind, our team has decided to work with the Reaching In team to make sure that we are far better prepared for the next storm, power outage, or unexpected crisis.



To that end, we have decided to dedicate the months of September and October this year to developing a comprehensive plan for future emergencies. This revised two-month focus will replace our original plan to focus on developing affordable childcare here in Charlevoix. Since we were not able to make the arrangement with Little Ducklings to move their operation here, due to

limitations in our facility, it makes sense for us to pivot and use those two months to enhance our emergency preparedness – not just for our own sake, but for the larger community's as well.

There were two populations that we felt were hardest hit in the recent storm that we want to be sure to have a plan for moving forward. The first is our own homebound participants who are living alone and with mobility limitations. The second group moves beyond our church family to anyone in the area who couldn't stay warm, fed, and in communication with others who could help them. Our plan will be sure to address these and other vulnerable populations, as we seek to be better prepared to provide tangible and compassionate support the next time a crisis arises.

I don't know how I would have made it through without the people of 1st Congregational United Church of Christ. The second lesson is related to the first, as I continue to think about the fact that 3/4ths of the population of our wonderful town have no church connection in their lives. I can't help but wonder where they would have turned at a time like this? Certainly, some of them have family or close friends in the area, but what about the ones who don't? I continue to believe that we have all got to get better at telling the uplifting story of our church with the purple doors and all that we provide one another in good times and in bad. We need to be active, articulate ambassadors for this incredible community of which we are a part, and what better time than on the heels of this storm that pushed so many Charlevoixians beyond their own resources?


The third lesson I learned from this storm is picked up by the Reaching Out Team in their article on page 6, and that is the fact that we were not nearly as well prepared as a church as we could and should have been for a storm and sustained power outage like this one. I was really proud of our brothers and sisters at The Community Reformed Church, who immediately opened their doors as a warming shelter, a device-charging station, and a provider of simple sandwiches for those who had nowhere else to turn. That struck me as exactly what Jesus would want those of us with church buildings to do with them when disaster strikes. I'd like to think that we, too, can put together a comprehensive emergency plan for this church, designed to help not just our own participants, but the community at large the next time an unexpected crisis hits.

Thank you all so very much for being the community that I've always dreamed of being a part.
